

Small droplets from indoor pesticide use can end up on surfaces and expose children



Pesticides sprayed outdoors can drift indoors through the air or ventilation systems



Pesticides can also seep into the soil and groundwater



Pesticides can take a long time to break down, which increases children's risk of exposure



Sources of Pesticide Exposure





Children are at higher risk for health complications from pesticide exposure because of their small size and developing nervous system

































Tips for Pest Management




Try to use non-toxic techniques first




If pesticide use is unavoidable, hire a licensed professional and have them apply the least toxic, effective product
